Highlights

- Scores from the spring 2010 Community College Survey of Student Engagement showed that SouthArk's scores for support for learners and student faculty interaction were higher than both the state and national average.
- The Department of Labor awarded \$3.5 Million for the South Arkansas Health Opportunities grant which will allow the reinstatement and expansion of some of the College's HNS programs as they transition into the new Health Science Center early next year.
- A new student government is under development and will have equivalent representation from both the East and the West campuses.
- An Associate of Arts degree has been approved by ADHE for online delivery.
- Faculty and professional staff gathered to develop the 2011-2016 strategic plan, "Build 2016", which will guide college activities for the next five years.
- SouthArk joined four other community colleges in the region to form the Southwest Arkansas Community College Consortium in order to work together and create opportunities for regional education and workforce development.
